### **Free Parking in Huntingdonshire**

As you know, introducing free parking was one of my key pledges, and I am very grateful for the time and effort your officers have dedicated to working with mine to help deliver this scheme across Huntingdonshire.

The introduction of free parking from 4pm in Huntingdon, St Neots and St Ives is a positive step that will help support our high streets and night-time economy.

In Peterborough, however, free parking begins at 3pm. This is a far more effective starting point, allowing parents undertaking the school run, residents attending appointments, and shoppers visiting our town centres later in the afternoon to benefit from the scheme. It also provides an additional boost to local businesses during what can often be a quieter part of the trading day.

I would therefore be grateful if the Council could consider whether there is any scope to contribute additional funding towards the scheme so that free parking in Huntingdonshire could begin from 3pm, aligning with the arrangements in Peterborough. Moreover, if there are any other parking schemes in Huntingdonshire towns that you think would be more beneficial, I would be very happy to meet with you or any other councillor to discuss this further.

## Mayoral Car Parking Offer

**Supplement: Mayor of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority - Letter 24<sup>th</sup> June 2026.**

### INTRODUCTION

A letter was received by Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC) from the Mayor of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) on the 24<sup>th</sup> June 2026. regarding “Free Parking in Huntingdonshire”.

*Please see document attached.*

This follows the offer made by the Mayor of the CPCA to introduce an element of free car parking in Council Car Parks from 4pm in Huntingdon, St Ives and St Neots by providing HDC with a grant to cover the loss of income.

Alongside the offer to HDC, the Mayor of the CPCA has also provided a grant to Peterborough City Council enabling them to operate a free parking scheme which begins at 3pm.

Since publication of the report, and the original proposal, The Mayor of the CPCA has asked the Council to consider whether there is any scope for the Council to contribute additional funding towards the scheme so that free parking could commence in Huntingdonshire from 3pm and align with Peterborough. (hereafter known as the Additional Mayoral Request)

The majority of the background, context and relevant analysis within the main report remain relevant to the consideration of this additional request, and other options.

### FINANCIAL IMPACT

The CPCA Grant Contribution for a parking scheme is set out in *table 1* which operates:

- Free after 4pm
- Monday to Friday

The assessment of the Free After 4pm scheme has been set out and considered in detail in the main report.

The tables below set out:

- The CPCA Grant Contribution (£370,000)
- The **additional funding (bold emphasis)** requirement above the CPCA Grant Contribution for both the Additional Mayoral Request, but also other options.

The Additional Mayoral Request is that the Council extend the scheme offering as set out in *table 2* which would operate.

- Free after 3pm (additional 1 hour daily)
- Monday to Friday

Whilst the Mayoral Offer and the Additional Mayoral Request are detailed in the main report and the above tables, the following tables set out the financial implications of extending the scheme to:

- Table 3: Free after 4pm Monday to Saturday (additional operating day)
- Table 4: Free after 3pm Monday to Saturday (additional operating hour and day)

The above shows that there would be a requirement for additional sums (ranging from £75,000 to £273,000) to enable the Council to extend the scheme beyond the current proposal.

In the Mayor of the CPCA latest letter, there is an expectation that the Council would cover these additional financial costs, with no additional sums being provided by the CPCA.

In short summary, none of the aforementioned options are affordable within the Grant Contribution being offered by the Mayor; they would result in a loss of projected income for the Council, and would create a financial pressure that the Council has not currently budgeted for.

## **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The suggestion of aligning HDC's free parking with Peterborough would have financial implications for Huntingdonshire District Council and would need to be considered within the Councils governance framework.

In accordance with Section 151 of the Local Government Act 1972, the Council must ensure the proper administration of its financial affairs, and any changes impacting income or expenditure must be appropriately assessed and managed. In addition, the duties set out in the Local Government Act 2003 require the Council to have regard to the robustness and affordability of its financial plans.

If Members are minded to extend the free parking offer being made by the Mayor of the CPCA, this would constitute a departure from the agreed budget position and would be outside of the approved budget framework.

Should this be the case, the proposal would be expected to be referred through the relevant governance process, including consideration by Full Council. It should be noted that this would have practical implications for delivery, and could elongate the delivery timescale.

It would be possible to budget for the year 2 of the scheme within the 27/28 budget setting process; but year 1 would need to be met via Reserves or Underspends in year.

As with the analysis in section 8.2.3 of the main report, the assessments cannot take account of behavioural change.

## **CONCLUSION**

The provision of an amended period could have extended, or alternative benefits or impacts in respect of the core matters set out in the main report.

Whilst alignment with the Mayor's offer to Peterborough could have some benefits in respect of alignment and ease of understanding for car park users (particularly those who are used to using both HDC and PCC car parks or those who have general

awareness of both schemes); it is clear that the Additional Mayoral Request is not affordable within the grant contribution proposed.

It would require additional funding from HDC, and that of itself would be outside of the approved budget framework. These additional sums would require funding from Reserves or Underspends in year; whilst recognizing there would be potential to budget for the following financial year.
