<p>CCG/24/24-25</p> <p>Upwood and the Raveleys Allotment Association (URCAA)</p> <p>Rainwater harvesting and Carbon saving</p>	<p>The provision of our own water allotment wide gives our allotment holders the chance to grow their own produce. Studies prove an allotment is very beneficial for people's mental health as well as the obvious physical benefits of outdoor exercise. With only one tap on site, it can be a bit of a trek and hard labour, exercise is one thing but hauling water can be difficult. This idea puts water at all points of the site and reduces carbon through the reduced use of pumps and vehicles needed at times to get water to the top of the site.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Improving quality of life and wellbeing Lowering carbon emissions 	<p>At present our association has 45 plot holders and one tap. We use around 50,000 litres of water through the tap which is located at the bottom end of a steep hill. Through previous applications we have enabled 4,000 litres of water to be collected from built structures. We reckon through the simple construction of a water rain harvesting "Bank" x 2 one at the top end of the site and one at the bottom we could collect upwards of 2,000 litres. Constructing a collection point using roof sheets and 4 number IBC;s and a storage facility of 15 x 200 litre drums we can save water throughout the rainy season giving us a total 7000 litres per Unit - 14,000 litres in total. if required more 200 litres drums are available for us to save water through the year.</p>	<p>£2,500</p>

<p>CCG/26/24-25</p> <p>Cornerstone Care in Confidence</p> <p>Wrap around support for mothers and babies - Ante Natal, Baby Bonding and Parenting classes</p>	<p>We always seek to improve the quality of life and wellbeing for our clients, partners and their families by helping them when they come to us frightened and in crisis emotionally because of their unplanned pregnancies. Being in shock and feeling unprepared can have detrimental mental health effects for them and their existing family/new baby. By offering ongoing support in the form of our Antenatal classes, baby bonding and parenting classes we can prepare them for what is to come, help to meet their emotional needs and concerns and guard against social isolation. Keeping people out of crisis Our support before, during and after pregnancy enables us to keep families out of a crisis as we are engaged with our clients regularly and can continue to help them as a crisis occurs. e.g. should they be experiencing post-natal depression, have debt (we make referrals to other, local agencies) or find that they are worried about their baby they know they can come to us to get find help or referrals, we have access to a home for mothers and babies with housing needs.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Improving the quality of life and wellbeing Keeping people out of crisis Helping people in crisis 	<p>For women who choose to continue their pregnancies we offer them the use of our baby boutique, where women can "shop for free" from maternity clothes to 12-month-old baby clothes, baby equipment, and supplies, including formula and nappies. <p>CCG/27/24-25</p> <p>St Neots Lawn Tennis Club</p> <p>Clubhouse Improvement and Refurbishment</p>	<p>The Clubhouse is an essential part of the provisioning of Tennis to the local community. The clubhouse, provisions, toilets, showers, changing rooms and simple catering facilities for food and drink. It is an essential refuge when the heavens open! It provides essential shelter for visitors, e.g. parents and guardians for the children being coached, together with a comfortable environment for parents to care for very small children (e.g. feed and change nappies etc). The Club is effectively the only facility in the Town where the public can play Tennis. The club has a user range from tots of 2 to 3 years old to Senior Citizens in their 80's The Club runs a comprehensive coaching programme for adults and for children. The club provides funding for its coach to visit and run regular tennis lessons in any local school that wants our club to provision this service. It is sad fact that if our community Tennis Club did not exist a large proportion of the Town's children would not have the opportunity to experience Tennis. Our children's tennis coaching classes at the Club are very popular and very well attended. Our Tennis Club is the venue of the local school's tennis championship finals each year and the Tennis Club happily hosts this finals day entirely at its own cost. It also should not be forgotten the important contribution the Tennis Club made to the physical and mental wellbeing of the local community during the pandemic. Happily, the pandemic is now over but the Tennis Club continues this important work each day.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Improving the quality of life and wellbeing for residents • Lowering carbon emissions 	<p>The Tennis Club House was built in the 1960s and needs major refurbishment. Last year the Club replaced the roof which was about to fail. The windows, doors and external cladding are in a poor state and require replacement. Currently the Clubhouse can only be accessed via steep steps. This project will include the provision of a disabled access ramp and viewing platform. This will enable the clubhouse to be accessible to wheelchair users, push chair users and anyone with mobility issues.</p>	<p>£2,500</p>
