

## APPENDIX 3

### **RESULTS OF INITIAL CONSULTATION ON OPTIONS**

- A1 As part of the process of stakeholder involvement in shaping the Core Strategy proposals, a range of groups and organisations was consulted in January and February this year on potential spatial objectives and policy approaches.
- A2 The basis for this consultation was the 'Initial Consultation on Options' report that Cabinet considered on 16 December 2004 (all or parts of which were circulated to the consultees, as appropriate to their main interests). This was supported by a draft of the sustainability appraisal Scoping Report, the findings of the Initial Sustainability Appraisal and the background paper on the settlement hierarchy.
- A3 Consultees included statutory agencies and service providers; the County, Town and Parish Councils (for whom special seminars were arranged); neighbouring authorities; and groups representing local business, community and environmental interests. The options were also considered by Overview & Scrutiny Panel (Planning & Finance) on 8 February, and by Development Control Panel on 9 February. In addition all Members were invited to comment on an individual basis.
- A4 Responses were received from 44 groups and individuals. A summary of their comments is attached; this also indicates suggested responses on behalf of the Council, in terms of whether changes to the draft objectives, policy approaches or sustainability appraisal appear to be merited. Where such changes are required, they have been incorporated in the Preferred Options Report circulated as Appendix 1 to this agenda item.
- A5 The settlement hierarchy attracted most interest, with arguments being made for a limited number of villages to be accorded a different status to that suggested by the background paper on settlement hierarchy (including Brampton, Kimbolton, Little Paxton, Somersham and Stilton). However the suggested hierarchy (which has been carried forward into the Preferred Options Report) is based upon a careful application of the criteria set out in the Structure Plan and emerging Regional Spatial Strategy. If the hierarchy is to prove robust and an effective means of steering development to the most sustainable locations, it is important that a consistent and objective approach is taken. As the background paper explains, the categorisation carries no implication that a particular level of growth will be directed to certain settlements, but it does suggest a logical set of priorities (starting with the Market Towns) that can be used when the Council comes to consider allocations.
- A6 The views of Overview & Scrutiny and DC Panel are not included in the schedule, but the key points arising from the Minutes are as follows:
- Both Panels expressed strong support for the suggested approach to securing an improved mix of market housing (policy area H4)
  - DC Panel suggested that the text supporting H5 (alteration or replacement of existing dwellings in the countryside) indicate that any replacement property should be on a site identical to the original. Such wording has not been added at this stage, as in some situations opportunities may exist to lessen the environmental impact of an isolated dwelling should redevelopment be proposed.

- DC Panel also suggested that further consideration be given to H9 and H10 (which concern retirement housing and nursing/care homes), in relation to where such development might be allowed. The text of these policy approaches has been clarified in the Preferred Options Report to make clear their scope and purpose, but not to allow retirement housing on a significant scale within smaller settlements (unless it were specifically for local elderly people in housing need, in which case provision could be made via the 'exceptions' policy H8). Other than limited 'infilling', general market housing in smaller settlements, even if limited to the over 55's, would not be appropriate in the context of national and strategic planning policies, and efforts to limit the need to travel and improve access to services.

#### Other approaches that might be considered

The council feel that there should be another tier between key centres (limited growth) and smaller settlements. The smaller settlement size as proposed will cover a broad range of villages in size and nature. This makes the policy too generalised and inflexible, and may not meet the needs of particular communities. For smaller settlements it is a negative policy, and may lead to further gentrification of village, putting homes out of the price range of the locals, as well as leading to the possible loss of further services e.g. schools, thereby forcing more people into cars

#### Council response

No change required. There is no provision in strategic guidance for another tier of settlements, and nor would this assist the move to a more sustainable pattern of development (as the Initial Sustainability Appraisal demonstrates). There is no evidence that increased growth in smaller settlements will reduce house prices nor assist the retention of services, unless it were on a massive scale.

### Comments on the content of the policy approach

#### Other approaches that might be considered

The comparison of facilities in villages does not appear to take into account sports and leisure facilities. Needingworth for example has two playing fields with a good range of outdoor sports facilities. The survey refers to public hall and does not take into account that Needingworth has another site with a separate sports pavilion.

#### Council response

No change required. The comparison covers a wide range of facilities, but cannot be exhaustive. It includes the key facilities identified by the Structure Plan and draft RSS. Inclusion of leisure facilities would not effect the overall outcome.

### Comments on the content of the policy approach

The Parish Council would welcome further discussions with Huntingdonshire District Council on where possible development could take place. Although the village does not have a range of shops or a GP, the village is close to St Ives. They are prepared to consider one larger development (100 houses) which could bring much needed affordable housing, sheltered housing, and other community benefits as well as sustain the primary school.

### Other approaches that might be considered

### Council response

No change required. The Core Strategy is not concerned with specific allocations, but a scheme on this scale would not be appropriate given Needingworth's proposed position in the settlement hierarchy (the reasons for which are set out fully in the settlement hierarchy background paper).

Organisation name: Kimbolton & Stonely Parish Council

### Comments on the content of the policy approach

Question the District Councils policy of restricting development to Market Towns and Key Centres (Potential Growth). There are many reasons why some development might be appropriate in villages, not least the question of sustainability of the village. It is appreciated that you cannot build your way to sustainability but there may equally be good reasons why some building should be permitted. The proposed policy precludes consideration of such an option.

### Council response

No change required. The general approach to locating development proposed for the Core Strategy accords with national and strategic guidance, and is the most sustainable option (as the Initial Sustainability Appraisal demonstrates). However, it does not preclude all development in Key Centres (Limited Growth) and smaller settlements, particularly where it caters for local needs.
